

Identity Protection PIN Application Checklist

An IP PIN is a free 6-digit code known only to you and the IRS—it helps prevent con artists from filing a tax return with your information.

Have these things handy.

Email address: Mobile phone linked to your name: Don't have a mobile phone? You'll have to get an activation code by mail. Social Security Number (SSN): No SSN? Use your Individual Tax Identification Number (ITIN). Tax filing status (check one): Single Head of Household Married Filing Jointly Qualifying Widow(er) Mailing address:

You'll need just one financial account number linked to your name.
